### PASTOR'S CORNER

Research by Pew, Gallop, Barna and others, and summarized by Ron Sider in Christianity Today has found, "Evangelical Christians are as likely to embrace lifestyles every bit as hedonistic, materialistic, self-centered, and sexually immoral as the world in general." What kind of response does that stir within you? There are a broad range of responses, but let me share two immediate actions and thoughts from the Scripture that you can apply personally.

The first is from Psalm 26:2 that says, "Test me, O Lord, and try me, examine my heart and my mind." What a powerful one sentence prayer to pray daily, especially as we head into the reflective practice of Lent where we reorient our life to the good news of Jesus Christ. Some of us practice the discipline of fasting during this time (abstaining from something to turn our attention more towards God). Whatever we put into place, the goal is to discover who we are in light of who Jesus is, essentially saying to Him: "Burn away my desire for anything that is not of You, any sinful surrender to the world."

The second is to recall and align to Jesus' prayer that He prayed in John 17:6-26. The whole passage is worth reading and reflecting upon, but let us focus in on the "oneness" that Jesus prays for all believers: "Sanctify them by the truth; Your word is truth...My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in Me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as You are in Me and I am in You. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent Me. I have given them the glory that You gave Me, that they may be one as We are one: I in them and You in Me" (vv. 17, 20-23a).

What does it mean for the Father and the Son to be one? We must understand this question if we are to know whether Jesus' prayer is being fulfilled in our lives. There are several instances where Jesus declares and embodies this in the Gospel of John (5:19; 12:29-50; 10:30;


14:9-11). What we see in these verses is that this oneness was proclaimed in the harmony that existed between the Father's will and the Son's very way of life and words that He taught. The same thing that caused God to do what He did is the same thing that caused Jesus to do and say what He did. Therefore, the oneness that Jesus prays for all those that would follow Him in John 17 is *not* a oneness in a common cause, to be obedient to leaders in particular faith community in which Christianity is compromised, or to be uniform and look precisely the same. The oneness that's demonstrated in the Gospel of John and taught to His disciples is different than that. Jesus is praying for the same kind of trust-filled relationship that works itself out in obedience as He had with the Father. It's so easy to become off focused, to become morally guided or rules-guided instead of Person-guided, isn't it? In light of Jesus' prayer, we should ask ourselves, "Does my life correspond to Jesus' teachings the way His life corresponded to the instructions of the Father? Do the things I teach and say I believe correspond to the way Jesus spoke and the things He believed as He revealed to us the very thoughts and words of God?"

As we reflect on this, we must repent and turn from all those things that have led us off the path of Jesus, that have separated us from Him, that have broken the oneness for which He prayed. Our lives and behaviors, to really live into this prayer of Jesus, must correspond to Jesus' teaching (and the teaching of the prophets and apostles) in the same way Jesus' behavior corresponded to the teachings of God the Father. All who are His sheep, who truly follow His voice (John 10:27), will pursue this oneness with all their hearts. There are many who have no interest in being one with the Son. They only want His benefits. We pursue truth ("sanctify them by Your truth"). We must never let our interpretations become the Word itself. This is what Jesus came into conflict over

again and again with the religious leaders of His day. Instead, as people of God, we must always revisit the Scriptures and ask, "Are we one with Jesus the way Jesus was one with the Father in our words, deeds, worldview, and assumptions?" We read the Scriptures with this purpose in mind: to listen and discern the voice of God amongst the "crowd" of voices that speak to us. We don't want to hold an opinion or act of behavior that is inconsistent with what He has told and shown us. We can't pull this off on our own; we must come to Him again and again in humility, "I see this way. Move in my life and help me see another way. Change my perspective from the inside out." My challenge for us as we journey towards Easter this month and following is to not only pray as David prayed, "Test me", but also pray to fulfill what Jesus desired: "May they be one as We are one."

# Is God to Blame? Moving Beyond Pat Answers to the Problem of Suffering


Is God to blame? This is often the question that comes to mind when we confront real suffering in our own lives or in the lives of those we love. Pastor Gregory A. Boyd helps us deal with this question honestly and biblically, while avoiding glib answers. Writing for ordinary Christians, Boyd wrestles with a variety of answers that have been offered by theologians and pastors in the past. He finds that a fully Christian approach must keep the person and work of Jesus Christ at the very center of what we say about human suffering and God's place in it. Yet this is often just what is missing and what makes so much talk about the subject seem inadequate and at times even misleading. What comes through in *Is God to Blame?* is a hopeful picture of a sovereign God who is relentlessly opposed to evil, who knows our sufferings and who can be trusted to bring us through them to renewed life.
